## 3. ECONOMIC VISION

Our vision is to develop and strengthen the local economy by realising our potential, capturing our opportunities and being as bold, innovative and determined as Cloncurry's pioneering forebears.



## 4. OUR HISTORY

In 1861 Burke and Wills, along with King and Gray, were the first Europeans to arrive in the area on their ill-fated expedition to the Gulf of Carpentaria. Burke named the river 'Cloncurry' for his cousin, Lady Elizabeth Cloncurry of County Galway in Ireland.

In May 1867 Ernest Henry, honoured as the founder of the town and the vast mineral wealth of the district, came to the area searching for grazing land. Instead, he discovered copper. He named this the 'Great Australia Mine'. The town of Cloncurry was surveyed in 1876 and named after the river.

Cloncurry has been the focal point for two of Australia's greatest innovations, featuring in the establishment of both QANTAS and the Royal Flying Doctor Service. The first scheduled aerial services for QANTAS operated from Cloncurry and the original hangar is still in use at the airport, where 'Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Services' is still proudly displayed above the door.

The Royal Flying Doctor Service was founded in Cloncurry in 1928, now recognised the world over. The airport was also enroute for early planes flying in from overseas and a stopping place for contestants in the Great Air Races of 1919 and 1934.

The Cloncurry region derives its main income from the mining and pastoral industries. The town itself is nestled on the banks of the Cloncurry River. The Cloncurry River catchment area begins in the Selwyn Ranges and flows into the Flinders River, where it continues on to empty into the Gulf of Carpentaria.

The Shire of Cloncurry has existed as a local government entity since 1884. The major town and administrative centre of the shire is Cloncurry, other towns include Dajarra, Duchess, Quamby and Kajabbi.

The Mitakoodi, Kalkadoon, Yulluna, Waluwarra and Pitta Pitta peoples are the Traditional Custodians of this region.

The shire holds a strategic location within the North West Minerals Province and is home to 3,705 persons (ABS ERP 2021). Cloncurry Shire has experienced a population increase of 580 persons when comparing 2016 and 2021 census data.

Accessible by road, rail and air, the shire provides a vital link in the Mount Isa to Townsville rail corridor connecting mining, agricultural and broader regional economic activity in Queensland's North West to the Townsville port.



## 5. THE ECONOMY

Our economy is built upon strengths in the transport, agriculture, tourism and mining industries. With a strong business environment and land available for a variety of commerce and industrial uses, Cloncurry has room for growing business.

The industry sectors which are the key propulsive drivers of Cloncurry Shire's economy in terms of regional exports, employment, value-added and local expenditure on goods and services (backward linkages) are Manufacturing, Transport, Postal and Warehousing and Construction.

Backward Linkages details the industry sectors which spend the most on locally sourced intermediate goods and services per dollar of output. These industry sectors may not necessarily make the largest contributions to the Region's economy at present however due to well-developed local supply chains these sectors have a significant capacity to deliver broad based economic benefits for the region.

Total gross revenue\* generated by businesses/ organisations in Cloncurry Shire is approximately \$3.42 billion (\$3,426.810 million), primarily driven by Mining (\$2.359 billion), Manufacturing (\$372 million), Construction (\$196 million), Agriculture (\$115 million) and Transport, Postal & Warehousing (\$83million). Tourism presently contributes \$28.4 million.

Similarly, our workforce\*\* is generally concentrated in mining, accounting for 25.6% of total local employment, followed by Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing (13.4%), Construction (8.9%), Public Administration & Safety (8.7%) and Transport, Postal and Warehousing (8.7%).

The base population remains relatively constant, and this is as attributable to the Shire's long pastoral heritage as it is to the community's resilience. Whilst not contributing to the resident workforce numbers, the relatively large mining FIFO component does allow fall-off in downturn cycles which can lessen direct impacts.

Despite rises and falls, economic growth shows moderate performance over the past ten years and is set to continue, with mineral mining expected to continue, if not increase over the coming decade and beyond.

Cloncurry Shire seeks opportunities to expand, grow and diversify the economy beyond the anticipated growth in mining to be less reliant or impacted upon through single sector activity.

Population retention and attraction driven through the creation of additional opportunities will be a key focus to ensure the continued prosperity of the Shire and the region.

## 6. REGIONAL STRENGTHS

#### **6.1 MINING INDUSTRY**

Mining has been one of the founding pillars and one of the economic strengths for Cloncurry for well over 100 years. Population within the community has ebbed and flowed to an extent in relation to the cyclical growth and contractions of the sector. The regional lodes are mineral rather than coal based which has provided some degree of continuity and within the current context, a positive outlook on the future.

Future opportunities include several new mines including gold, copper, zinc, and rare earth elements which will be mined, processed and transported to markets from Cloncurry. With an abundance of mineral resources, access to electricity generation and water supplies there is tremendous capacity for industries to grow and provide a secure future for the town.



Queensland is home to an abundance of critical minerals the world needs to reduce carbon emissions. We need critical minerals for battery storage, solar panels, electric vehicles, smartphones, laptops, and wind turbines. Cloncurry is strategically placed in the North West Minerals Province to take advantage of these new opportunities.

#### **6.2 AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION**

The beef cattle industry is well established and a significant contributor and integral component of both the Cloncurry and Queensland economy. As with mining, the cattle industry is supported by a strong transport sector – predominately in the delivery of cattle to the Port of Townsville.

The Cloncurry Saleyards are the second largest cattle handling facility in Queensland, with the capacity to hold up to 20,000 head of cattle. The yards have had recent upgrades which have improved safety and usability of the facility. In 2022, Cloncurry Saleyards hosted the first bull sale in Cloncurry in over 10 years. The newly covered sales and exhibition areas with bar facilities hosted buyers from all over Queensland and as far reaching as the Northern Territory. Cloncurry Shire Council is in the process of constructing 20 bull pens, to enable more bull and cattle sales in the future.

Sitting at the junction of five major freight routes and the Townsville to Mount Isa railway line, Cloncurry has long been regarded as one of the nation's premier freight hubs. The convergence of multiple freight routes allows for efficient transportation of cattle and livestock. It provides convenient access to various markets, processing facilities, and export ports, reducing the time and cost involved in transporting cattle. The efficiency enhances the competitiveness of Cloncurry's cattle industry. Cloncurry is accessible from all directions, with access to the Territory, East to the coast, and access to the southeast corner. The connectivity to multiple freight routes facilitates better integration within the cattle industry's supply chain. It enables the seamless movement of cattle from farms to processing facilities, feedlots, and distribution centres. This integration streamlines logistical operations and enhances overall supply chain efficiency, benefiting both producers and buyers.



Cloncurry Saleyards have proven to be a key asset to the community. The recent cattle numbers passing through the town support this statement, with Cloncurry consistently recording over 200,000 head of cattle transiting through the facility since 2017. Cloncurry Shire Council is continuing to invest in the facility to ensure its future growth.

#### **6.3 TRANSPORT ROUTES**

Accessible by road, rail and air, our shire provides a vital link in the Mount Isa to Townsville rail corridor connecting mining, agricultural and broader regional economic activity in Queensland's North West to the Townsville port.

#### **ROAD NETWORK**

In addition to connecting communities, the road network is intrinsically linked to economic outcomes. Cloncurry's key propulsive drivers are reliant on road infrastructure.

From 2016 to 2026 Queensland's road freight tonne-kilometres are forecasted to grow by 28.3 per cent to 62.0 billion tonne-kilometres. Trucks and road trains make up a relatively high proportion of all traffic on the North West Queensland region's freight routes and highways.

Mining and agriculture industries rely on freightefficient vehicles, network access, and direct and reliable access to ports and markets, sometimes over significant distances. The freight industry is using larger and more freight efficient vehicle combinations (also referred to as high productivity freight vehicles) to meet demand and improve productivity, but uptake can be limited due to inconsistent road conditions, and network connectivity and reliability.

Expansion of mining and agriculture activity is a key economic development objective for the region. More road freight activity will generate more challenges for road safety and road maintenance. The feasibility of new mining and agriculture ventures might depend in some cases on investment in road network improvements to support access for higher productivity vehicles.

#### **RAIL NETWORK**

The Mount Isa line system is over 1,000km of track which extends from Stuart (near Townsville) to Mount Isa and includes the Phosphate Hill branch. The line is a critical link from the North West Minerals Province to the Port of Townsville, where most bulk products are exported. Cloncurry is home to Aurizon's rollingstock and train crew depot.

#### **AIRPORT**

Currently operating five days per week servicing FIFO and regular passenger service, with upgraded airport facilities offering expansion opportunities.

Cloncurry is home to the Queensland Flight Test range. This state-of-the-art uncrewed aerial systems test facility is the first of its kind in Australia. The Queensland Government provided \$14.5 million to develop the foundation stage of the facility which provides users access to test and evaluate technology development.

Cloncurry Shire Council is progressing the development of the Cloncurry Airport Master Plan – expected to be completed July 2023.

The Cloncurry Aerodrome is also home to the Horizon Airways flight school which opened in January 2022. Locals previously had to travel to Alice Springs or the coast to obtain a licence.

Cloncurry Airport has been the focal point for many of Australia's greatest innovations. Cloncurry was involved with the beginnings of QANTAS, and the original QANTAS hangar is still in use at the aerodrome, where "Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Service" is still displayed above the hangar door.



#### **6.4 LIVEABILITY**

Cloncurry offers a liveable and welcoming environment for its residents. The town is known for its strong community spirit, where residents foster a sense of togetherness and support. This creates a friendly and inclusive atmosphere that contributes to the overall quality of life in Cloncurry.

In terms of amenities, while Cloncurry may not have an extensive range like larger cities, it provides essential services to meet residents' daily needs. Grocery stores, medical facilities, schools, and public transportation are available, ensuring convenience and accessibility for the local population.

One notable aspect of Cloncurry's liveability is its affordability. Housing in the town is generally more affordable compared to major cities, making it an attractive option for individuals and families seeking a more cost-effective lifestyle. This affordability contributes to a lower cost of living overall.

Cloncurry's natural surroundings add to its appeal. Situated in a scenic region, with the Selwyn Ranges nearby, residents have the opportunity to engage in outdoor activities such as hiking, camping, and fishing. The natural beauty of the area enhances the quality of life and offers opportunities for relaxation and recreation.

Furthermore, Cloncurry provides strong community services, including healthcare facilities, schools, and social services. These services are crucial for residents' well-being, ensuring access to necessary healthcare, education, and support systems.

While mining is a significant industry in Cloncurry, the town offers employment opportunities in various sectors, which contributes to its economic stability and job prospects for residents.

In terms of community life, Cloncurry hosts cultural and sporting events throughout the year. These events bring the community together, providing entertainment and opportunities for socializing and connecting with fellow residents.







Overall, while Cloncurry may have fewer amenities compared to larger urban centres, its strong community spirit, affordability, access to essential services, natural surroundings, and employment opportunities contribute to a liveable and fulfilling lifestyle for its residents.

Cloncurry provides its residents and surrounding properties access to a wide range of essential and specialist health, hospital and medical facilities, education and family services and community facilities.

Its relaxed lifestyle and short commutes make it an ideal place to live, work and play.

Voted as Queensland's Friendliest Town in 2013 and 2018, Cloncurry's quality outback hospitality earned itself the reputation as the friendly heart of the great north-west.

The 'Curry' as its affectionately known to locals, prides itself on being 'the Friendly Heart of the Great North West'.

Cloncurry hosts a broad range of events including Cloncurry Stockman's Challenge and Campdraft, Curry Merry Muster Festival, Beat the Heat Festival, Cloncurry and District Show and the Quamby rodeo.

Locals love living in Cloncurry. It is a friendly, safe and welcoming community. The diverse lifestyle creates a relaxing and stress-free environment. The natural beauty throughout the region is good for your spirit.



## 7. GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES


#### 7.1 BEEF INDUSTRY

- The current opportunities presented by the Cloncurry Saleyards and its supporting infrastructure include the potential for establishing beef processing (abattoir) and feedlotting facilities. Centralising the finishing and processing of cattle within the region would lead to cost reductions in transportation and minimise weight loss during transit. A conservative estimate suggests a throughput of approximately 115,000 head per annum. These opportunities could significantly enhance the cattle industry's efficiency and economic viability in the Cloncurry area.
- Earlier pre-feasibility studies have shown sufficient cattle numbers exist within the north-western Queensland catchment for an abattoir with significant supply chain cost advantages to operate in the region.
- An abattoir located in the Cloncurry area would offer a significant cost saving opportunity with an estimated catchment of approximately 100,000 slaughter ready cattle per year, based on existing Queensland regional turnoff rates. Adding to potential throughput numbers would be culled breeders and older stock from adjacent shires, as well as cattle from the Northern Territory, which currently pass through Cloncurry enroute to Central Queensland finishing properties.
- Particularly in light of recent capacity upgrades to the Cloncurry Saleyards, the location is well placed to offer opportunities for investors to view Cloncurry as a logical and attractive option for a substantial inland beef processing plant serving northern Australia.

#### 7.2 MINING INDUSTRY

 Critical minerals are the essential components for production of emerging technologies such as electric vehicles, renewable energy products and storage and low-emission power sources. The North West Minerals Province contains one of the world's richest deposits of critical minerals worth an estimated \$500 billion.

- The \$22.6 million expanded Queensland Collaborative Exploration initiative will support Queensland's exploration companies over the next five years (2022-2027) to discover the future mines to produce the minerals and metals the world needs to decarbonise.
- Prospects which exist for Cloncurry Shire come not only in the form of employment, but in supply chain opportunities, provision of goods and services, local population growth and upgrading of infrastructure.
- Strategies are required to ensure potential opportunities and advantages are captured locally.
- Development of an annual Mining conference would have tremendous flow on economic impacts for the local community, whilst highlighting the region as a great place to invest.
- Future opportunity may exist for the establishment of a Sulphuric Acid plant in the North West Minerals Province to support future sulphuric acid needs.



#### 7.3 AGRICULTURE INDUSTRY

- Australia's cotton industry is expanding north on the back of water availability and new cotton varieties.
   Leading genetics and agronomics have underpinned sustainable growth in cotton production. 42 million bales of cotton are traded globally and is expected to grow by 2.4% per annum over the next 10 years. Expansion of the North Queensland cotton industry will depend on having access to a local gin to reduce supply chain costs. A local cotton gin will deliver regional economic and community benefits; increased farm returns, irrigated land improvement, and cottonseed is highly valued as a stock feed supplement.
- North West Queensland has the potential to grow the value of agricultural production with irrigated and diversified agriculture opportunities. A report prepared by Coriolis in December 2018 (Enhancing Agricultural Production and Employment in North West) suggests the region has the land, water and resources required to dramatically increase agricultural production. Countries with a similar climate are achieving export success by producing a wider range of market-competitive products. These products include cotton, sorghum, shea, castor, sesame, mung, mango and cassava.

- Opportunity exists for irrigated and diversified agriculture which include cotton, camel, goats, sorghum, mung bean, mango, grapes, peanuts, bush tucker (supporting agri-tourism).
- The Cloncurry region is home to one of Australia's oldest wild camel populations - the remnant legacy of more than 200 Afghan cameleers and 2,000 camels who lived and worked in Queensland during the late 19th and early 20th Century. A growing number of wild camels are being utilised as dairy animals, as interest and demand in the camel milk industry builds. Currently 10 dairies are in operation across Australia, with products including fresh pasteurised camels' milk, cheese, ice-cream, yoghurt, camel milk powder and skincare. There are no camel dairies in Northern Australia. With ready access to wild camel herds and market prices of up to \$25 per litre for fresh milk, there exists the opportunity for an investor / farmer to establish a farm and dairy facility in Cloncurry Shire to take advantage of the growing national and particularly international market. Of lesser value, but equal in opportunity via accessibility is the potential conversion of feral goat herds in the region for dairying, or meat - with goat being the most consumed meat in the world and Australia as the largest exporter.





- Cloncurry Shire has potential for freshwater aquaculture. A study completed in 2017 (GHD Advisory commissioned by Department of State Development) indicated commercial viability at favourable levels particularly for small-medium sized farming of freshwater crayfish, with well located aquaculture ponds at relative low-risk of flooding during the monsoon season and good transport network connectivity provided east to Townsville, west to Mount Isa and north to Darwin, providing distribution nationally and internationally. Barramundi farming also showed viability, albeit as a slightly lesser valued commodity. The seafood market in general is a growing sector with demand for sustainable product increasing.
- · Agaves have shown the ability to successfully grow in the region and can produce around 400 tonne per hectare of bio-mass in 5 years, requires no irrigation, and delivers a high amount of fermentable juice and fibre. Native to the arid highlands of Mexico, blue agave is a fleshy succulent that is grown commercially as the base ingredient for tequila and mezcal. There's potential for Cloncurry to consider plantings as biofuel (ethanol), however there are other opportunities which could lend themselves to the creation of locally produced and branded products. Processing facilities would need to be close for viability. Agaves take four to five years to grow but require very little water and generate very little waste. Upon harvesting the sugar can be used for candies and syrup, the fibres can be fed to cattle, the outer leaves can be used to make rope.





#### 7.4 INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT

- Cloncurry is situated strategically within the booming North West Minerals Province. The growth in the mining sector, a well-established pastoral industry and strong transport infrastructure positions Cloncurry for growth.
- Cloncurry has room for growing business. Cloncurry Shire has an Industrial Estate available for a wide variety of commercial and industrial uses, with development of Stage 2 on the horizon. The lots are fully serviced with reticulated water, sewer, stormwater drainage, telecommunications, mains power and road train accessible.
- The region also has rail maintenance facilities which currently have excess capacity which could be used to provide maintenance and repair services to locomotives used in the regional mines.
- Development of a Common User Rail Load Out
  Facility would support supply chain productivity,
  efficiency and reliability and would further cement
  Cloncurry's position as the centre of the North
  West Minerals Province unlocking further freight
  efficiency to the entire North West region. The
  estimated \$30 million facility would consist of a rail
  loop into grounds where trucks would deliver mining
  products or minerals to the dock and would allow
  mining companies in the region access to a mineto-port solution.
- Development of a business incubator hub would support growth of businesses and further investment in the Cloncurry Shire.
- There is a bright future for the film industry in rural Queensland. The Cloncurry region has already played host to several productions including Australian Survivor 2021, ABC Back Roads and the soon to be released The Bank Manager with a council film incentive program enticing projects out to the region. Cloncurry is well positioned to attract and support film production.
- Explore Defence opportunities including munitions testing facility.
- The Queensland Flight Test Range located at the Cloncurry Aerodrome consists of a commercial quality runway, dedicated hangar and workshop, range control centre, range control system including

- a primary surveillance radar and other surveillance and tracking equipment, dedicated airspace and regulatory approvals for unmanned aerial systems (UAS) flight test range (FTR) operations. The commercial FTR allows Australia's burgeoning UAS industry to conduct research into developing new technologies and to test and evaluate their platforms and payloads.
- CopperString 2032 is the largest ever economic development project in North Queensland, and the largest expansion to the power grid in Australia. CopperString 2032 will provide energy certainty to the region's burgeoning critical minerals sector, delivering reliable, affordable and renewable power to the people, businesses and communities in the region. It will also allow the development of new renewable generation resources to be developed and the renewable power to be sold into the NEM.
- Cave Hill is located some 18km south of Cloncurry. It is the only site within the Cloncurry River catchment shortlisted in a CSIRO report as a "promising site" for a dam, one of only three in the entire Flinders River catchment. Cave Hill Dam was considered by the Joint Select Committee on Northern Australia in 2014 and put forward for further consideration on the basis that it provided a way of increasing the supply of town water to Cloncurry, thereby supporting potential development for a feed lot and abattoir, and expansion of mining and industry. The main drivers for a major storage on the Cloncurry River are to provide sufficient, affordable water to develop an irrigated agriculture precinct, additional water for industry and water security for the community.

#### 7.5 TOURISM INDUSTRY

- Cloncurry has an opportunity to increase visitation through regional promotion, attraction of events, expansion of existing activities and attractions, as well as the development of new product / experiences. These will positively impact on the local economy through extended length of stay and increase in local spend.
- Cloncurry features on the major touring routes Matilda Way and Overlanders Way and is positioned on the major drive routes north to the Gulf, south, east to the coast and west to the

Northern Territory. There are also new touring routes including Drive North West that feature Cloncurry. Cloncurry is included in both the North West Loop and the Discovery Drive as part of the Drive North West initiative – all of which provide great opportunities for new product and experience development. An increase in visitation in the Shire will drive economic activity, through increased demand for accommodation and expenditure on food and beverage.

- Cloncurry has a distinct opportunity to leverage and expand visitation based upon the significant historical linkages to QANTAS, the Royal Flying Doctor Service and Burke and Wills, as well as the rich (and current) history of mining and cattle farming.
- Opportunities for expansion of existing activities and attractions, as well as the development of new experiences which take advantage of Cloncurry's natural assets which positively impact the local economy through extended length of stay and increase in local spend. Production of local food and beverage offerings is also an opportunity, but likely in boutique products leveraging a local / regional brand.

#### 7.6 SUPPORTING LOCAL BUSINESS

- Provide support, guidance and leadership to ensure the necessary environment is created and maintained to enable success and prosperity for business and community.
- Local business is encouraged to grow and expand through the provision of awareness of opportunities.
- Skills shortages are understood, and actions taken to assist in addressing to grow the local workforce.
- Ensuring mining service and other support opportunities are capitalised locally through providing capability support.



## 8. KEY OUTCOMES

Key Outcomes will be used to measure the effectiveness of the strategy. Outcomes have been divided into four themes; enabling infrastructure; investment attraction; enhanced liveability; and strong business community.

#### 8.1 ENABLING INFRASTRUCTURE

- Support efficient movement of goods to market through efficient transport and freight infrastructure links.
- Tourism infrastructure which unlocks the Shire's natural assets and enables strong visitation to the region.
- Urban infrastructure to enhance the appeal of the community within the Cloncurry Shire, improving liveability to attract new residents and tourists.

- Health and education infrastructure to provide a higher standard of living and improving retention of residents through all stages of their life.
- Reliable, affordable and sustainable water infrastructure which supports regional and industry growth.
- A reliable and affordable energy system which accelerates growth.
- Telecommunications infrastructure which enables connectivity to drive business innovation.

#### **8.2 INVESTMENT ATTRACTION**

- Property development including housing and industrial land development.
- Increased aged care, primary health and allied health services.



- New and alternative accommodation offerings to support tourism – eco stays, farm stays, glamping.

- Business forums and events hosted in region.

   workforces).


